We Won't Be Here Long

Ilka Tampke

A meditation on nature and intergenerational trauma, We Won't Be Here Long unfolds over a single day – raw, poetic, and as unyielding as the forest itself.

At 9:13 a.m. on a warm morning, textile artist and mother of two Nellika Werner is struck by a falling tree limb while walking her dog in a remote forest.

Pinned and unable to move, Nellika's instinct is to survive: stave off dehydration, signal for help, free herself. But as the hours stretch on, it becomes clear rescue may never come.

As the forest becomes both her captor and confessor, Nellika embarks on an unflinching moral reckoning. Fragmented memories take her back to the scars of her own childhood and forward to the ways she has struggled – and failed – as a mother herself. While her love for her children is fierce, she feels lost in her inability to be the mother she thought she'd be.




Learned Behaviours



George Maskey, a crippled ex-biker, is viewed by many locals as a hollow braggart responsible for much of the town's crime. His wife sees him as foolish and blames him for the death of their teenage twins. To his soon-to-be daughter-in-law, Celeste, he is a cuckold. His gay stepson considers him a racist homophobe.

However, George Maskey is not the hero of this story.

That role belongs to his secret first-born son, Rodney, an outcast who has lived in the forest on the Knuckle, tending to Maskey's marijuana plantations since the untimely death of his mother.

Rodney, a love-starved reader of romance novels and a dreamer is George's right-hand man and playing a long game, finding acceptance into the Maskey family on his own terms.


A beautiful work about art, gender, disappointment, understanding and ultimately celebration.

While still grieving for Margaret, Leonora meets and befriends Anna, the Polish woman who lives next door.

Leonora becomes increasingly involved with Anna and her family and has a strong influence on Anna's daughter Lydia, introducing her to literature and art.

This is a novel about the ways we all long for acceptance and the ways in which those we might feel most in touch with – including parents, siblings and mentors – can often have very different values and views about us.




What does a woman in her seventies make of her life on the other side of blindness?

Beatrice's reality is upended when she loses her sight. While her mathematician husband is away at work at Columbia or visiting the Metropolitan Museum of Art, she wanders through their empty house north of New York City and allows her mind to drift into unexpected and painful places.

There are solid guideposts for her along the way—
remembered paintings and novels to contemplate;
memories of her husband, children, and parents; her
close friendship with a neighbor—but her fragmented
thoughts often rabbit-hole in a dozen directions,
offering an intimate and original portrait of a mind
in motion.

Blindness has isolated Beatrice, removed her from what she can verify with her own eyes, but it also may offer her a gateway into new possibilities—a "re-visioning" of her world.


Foreign Country Marija Peričić

A beautifully crafted work that delves into the fallibility of memory, questioning whether we can ever truly know the ones we love or ourselves

Sisters Eva and Elizabeta Novak have not spoken since Eva's young daughter, Gracie was killed in a road accident.

More than a decade after the accident, Eva returns to Australia at her sister Elizabeta's insistence. Upon arriving, she discovers that Elizabeta has died. As the appointed executor of her sister's estate, Eva tackles the monumental task of clearing out Elizabeta's house.

Through the objects and documents she encounters, Eva reconnects with her sister and confronts their shared past, marked by trauma and migration.



Why this book?


Good News: The worst has already happened.

This is a fictional theory, a rant, a manifesto, an engagement or disengagement with the times, a record; it is bearing witness, a dramatisation of actual events, a horror-scape, either a monologue or dialogue, a testament, travel guide, handbook, textbook, potential encyclopaedia.

It is a spectrum, shades of black from the dark to the next shade up from white, a proliferation, a step-back, a righting, a note to oneself, a line in the sand or a gust in the form of a structure-shaking gale; it is a dance (a two-footed, single-person line dance), an experiment, pure science, flicking the finger; it is of course backing away, crossing the street and avoiding eye contact.

You may just have to read *The Theory of Everything* because these are just alluding-to-the-theory words.






Amidst turmoil, one man's journey reveals the messy yet beautiful tapestry of life and love

Incarcerated in Tehran's Evin and Qarchak prisons for 804 days, Kylie was held in a filthy solitary confinement cell for months, and subjected to relentless interrogation. She was pushed to the limits of her endurance by extreme physical and psychological deprivation.

Multiple hunger strikes, letters smuggled to the media, coordinated protests with other prisoners and a daring escape attempt led to her transfer to the isolated desert prison, Qarchak, to live among convicted criminals.

On November 25, 2020, after more than two years of struggle, Kylie was finally released in a high stakes three-nation prisoner swap deal.




