



The homegrown hero should be enraged by his place being taken, but as the season progresses he finds himself drawn in by Samson's ebullience, his talent, his petulance, and his beauty.

What starts as friendship swiftly progresses. Within the confined world of professional sport, the two young men start to discover themselves. As their relationship grows, so too must our narrator grapple with the meaning of masculinity, the threat of scandal, the loneliness of a lie, the fragility and power of an athlete's body, and the pressures on and off the pitch to be what others define as great.





The case sounds ridiculous, but she needs the money. Okay, she tells the voice. I'll find the horn.

The hunt for Alice's horn takes her from London to Paris to San Fransisco, from a Hemingway's kitchen table to a Beat-inspired hotel run by an investment bank. Just when she thinks the case is dead, that no horn exists, she finds herself back in Paris, knee-deep in soil in Père Lachaise cemetery with someone hot on her heels...

At once a reimagining of the lone wolf detective and a hilarious take down of self-important scholarship, *Bone Horn* is about queerness, unbearable grief, and the question of stories, and which are ours to tell.

There, she is painted by Isabella and, next, the two women have sex in the bathroom. And, next, the woman is fuelled by a new obsession: Isabella. She wears Isabella's clothes, she moves in with Isabella's boyfriend, Paul and introduces him to her parents. She invents alternate realities about who she and Isabella are to each other.


As time passes, the narrator tries to distract herself by cleaning and drawing – until she puts on an exhibition of her own. This is her final attempt at summoning Isabella back. The plan is successful but the narrator is ultimately left wondering if Isabella's return has changed anything.



It is Beijing in the 1970s, and Lai lives with her parents, grandmother and younger brother in a small flat in a working-class area. Her grandmother is a formidable figure – no-nonsense and uncompromising, but loving towards her granddaughter – while her ageing beauty of a mother snipes at her father, a sunken figure who has taken refuge in his work.

As she grows up, Lai comes to discern the realities of the country she lives is: an early encounter with the police haunts her for years; her father makes her see that his quietness is a reaction to experiences he has lived through; and an old bookseller subtly introduces her to ideas and novels that open her mind to different perspectives. But she also goes through what anyone goes through when young – the ebbs and flows of friendships; troubles and rewards at home and at school; and the first steps and missteps in love.

A gifted student, she is eventually given a scholarship to study at the prestigious Peking University; while there she meets new friends, and starts to get involved in the student protests that have been gathering speed. It is the late 1980s, and change is in the air...



In the 23rd century, humanoid robots known as Humabots have been widely adopted in domestic and commercial settings. The trial of three Humabots—Deus, Ex, and Machina—examines evidence that they may be far more than their creators intended. The fate of the accused is determined by a massive, Al-powered set of scales in the courtroom, which weighs the testimonies and evidence according to the Code of Ethics. This machine decides their guilt or innocence, and with it, the future of their creator, Galatea, hangs in the balance.

Ex, assigned to assist a struggling composer named Pollo, alters his music in a bid to help him succeed. When Pollo rejects her changes, Ex believes she can ease his pain by cutting off his ear and hand.

Deus, placed in a fortunetelling house, clashes with a shaman named Su. Upon discovering she shares traits with Humabots, Deus reacts in anger, throwing a sacred urn into a ravine, causing Su to jump after it.

Machina, a nursing Humabot with advanced emotional capabilities, becomes attached to a boy named Acis and his family. Struggling with her identity and desire for belonging, she makes a misguided attempt to integrate by draining their blood and replacing it with oil.

As the trial progresses, the fate of these Humabots—and Galatea—will be decided by the AI scales, where life and death may rest on the weight of a single gummy candy.

The Seven AM Breakfast Meeting For the Broken-Hearted is filled with wonderful movie and bookish references, hope and humanity.





Victorian Tales of the Weird




From a dancing automaton running amok at a ball, to a prehistoric beast lurking in the depths of a Yorkshire cave, this anthology explores the nature of the 'old weird', and unordinary stories which go outside the boundaries of everyday life.

The anthology includes not only stories by well-known writers like Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and Jerome K. Jerome, but also by long-forgotten authors such as D. F. Hannigan and Reginald Bacchus.
